Your red and green boxes are collected **once every two weeks** on alternate weeks.

Your blue box for recycling glass is collected **once every four weeks**

Your refuse is collected **once a week** in black sacks.

Red Box

- ✓ paper (loose – not in plastic bags)
- ✓ newspapers, magazines, junk mail, catalogues and telephone directories
- ✗ no card/cardboard, or shredded paper

Please note – shredded paper can be home composted.



Green Box

- ✓ food, drink and petfood cans – wash and squash if possible
- ✓ empty aerosol cans
- ✓ plastic bottles – tops off and squash if possible
- ✓ card and cardboard, including drinks cartons – please flatten boxes
- ✓ clothes and shoes tied in pairs – please place in a carrier bag
- ✗ no glass or any other material such as paint tins, flower pots, engine oil containers, food trays, cling film, foil, dirty rags, toys and housewares, polystyrene, sheets, pillows or other bed linen.



Blue Box

- ✓ glass bottles and glass jars – all colours, shapes and sizes
- ✗ no windscreen or window glass, light bulbs or fluorescent tubes
- ✗ no cooking glassware such as Pyrex or Visionware
- ✗ no other kitchen glassware, broken glass, lids or bottle tops.
